FIVE THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW

- UVA became the first FBS team this century to punt 13 times in a game and still win when it defeated BYU in the season opener, 19-16.
- Oregon is only the second team from the Pac-12 to come to Scott Stadium, USC was the first in 2008.
- Oregon has never played inside an ACC stadium, Scott Stadium on Saturday will be its first.
- Ian Frye's 53-yard field goal against BYU is the longest in the nation this season and is tied for the third-longest in UVA history.
- UVA has the most underclassmen in the nation on its depth chart with 34.

VIRGINIA WINS SEASON OPENER FOR THE FOURTH YEAR IN A ROW

- Virginia has won four straight season openers after its 19-16 win over BYU. The current streak follows a stretch (2006-09) where the Cavaliers lost four consecutive season openers.
- UVA is now 80-35-9 (.681) all-time in season openers and 74-19-7 (.775) when that game is played at home, including 17 of their ITS 20.
- Virginia has opened up its season at Scott Stadium six consecutive years.
- UVA head coach Mike London is the only UVA head coach to win the season opener in each of his first four seasons in Charlottesville.

VIRGINIA VS. TOP-5 TEAMS

- Oregon will be just the third top 3-ranked non-conference team to play in Charlottesville.
- No. 3 USC opened up the 2008 season with a 52-7 victory over the Cavaliers.
- Prior to USC coming to Charlottesville in 2008 it had been 64 years since the last occurrence when No. 2 North Carolina Pre-Flight, led by QB Otto Graham, and UVA played to a 13-13 tie.
- Before the Trojans and UVA faced each other in 2008, the Cavaliers highest-ranked non-league opponent was No. 2 Notre Dame in the 1989 Kickoff Classic (ND 36-13).
- UVA is 2-17-1 all-time vs. top-five teams, including 2-6-1 at home.
- UVA's last win and appearance vs. a top-5 team was Oct. 15, 2004 vs. No. 4 Florida State (26-21).

OREGON MAKES FIRST TRIP TO AN ACC STADIUM

- Oregon is making its first trip to an ACC stadium when it comes to Scott Stadium on Saturday.
- Virginia is only the second different active ACC opponent Oregon has faced. The Ducks faced in the 1992 Independence Bowl and the 2002 Seattle Bowl.
- Oregon did play road games at current ACC members Miami and Pitt before they were in the league.
- The Miami game was in 1958, and Pitt was 1956 and 1965.
- Oregon has never played in the Commonwealth of Virginia before.

VIRGINIA VS. OREGON AND THE PAC-12

- Virginia is facing Oregon for the first in program history.
- Saturday's game is only the fourth time Virginia has faced a member of the Pac-12 Conference.
- UVA is 0-3 against the Pac-12 and its the only BCS conference the Cavaliers are winless against.
- UVA is the second team from the Pac-12 to ever travel to Scott Stadium and the first since USC in 2008.
- UVA returned the trip to USC on Sept. 11, 2010 and fell to the then-No. 14 Trojans, 17-14 in head coach Mike London's first road contest at the helm of Virginia.
- UVA also lost at Washington in 1976.
- The Cavaliers will play at Oregon in 2016.

ANTHONY HARRIS IS THE WALTER CAMP NATIONAL DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

- The Walter Camp Football Foundation announced its first 2013 Football Bowl Subdivision National Offensive and Defensive Players of the Week, presented by Generation UCAN. Virginia junior strong safety Anthony Harris was selected as the national defensive player of the week.
- Harris posted 11 tackles, including three solo stops, recorded one quarterback sack, blocked a punt and intercepted a pass in UVA's season-opening 19-16 victory against BYU. Harris' blocked punt in the third quarter set up Virginia's first touchdown.
- With UVA trailing 16-12 and three minutes left to play, Harris picked off a third-down BYU pass, returned it six yards and then pitched the ball to linebacker Henry Coley, who ran another 27 yards. Virginia scored the winning touchdown on the next play.

WEEKLY PRESS CONFERENCE

On each Monday during the football season, the UVA Athletics Media Relations office will conduct a weekly football press conference, attended by head coach Mike London and selected student-athletes. London will field questions beginning at 3 p.m. and student-athletes will begin interviews at 3:30 p.m. Snacks will be served.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

Players are available for interviews each Monday, depending on class schedules. If you have specific player interview requests, they should be directed to Vincent Briedis in the UVA Athletics Media Relations office by Noon Sunday.

Requested defensive players and defensive coaches will be available for telephone interviews Tuesday, while offensive players and offensive coaches will be available Wednesday.

No player or coach interviews will be arranged after Wednesday during game week.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

Coach London will hold his postgame press conference in the media room, while requested players and assistant coaches will be brought to the media room to meet with media representatives after London. UVA athletics media relations personnel will take player requests during the fourth quarter of each game.

Virginia's locker room is closed to media following games, both at home and on the road.

UNIQUELY UVA

The University of Virginia is an institution rich with history and tradition. Here is some of the terminology that contributes to UVA's culture.

Grounds: The term used by students, faculty and alumni to refer to the University dating as far back as Thomas Jefferson. "Campus" is never used.

First Year, Second Year, Third Year, Fourth Year: Instead of freshman, sophomore, junior, senior. Why you may ask? To be a "senior" implies that a person has reached the final phase of learning, a feat that Thomas Jefferson believed to be impossible, arguing instead that education is a life-long process.

Commonwealth: Virginia is one of four constituent states of the United States of America that officially uses the name "Commonwealth" instead of the word state in all references. The other three commonwealths are Kentucky, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania.

ACC INJURY GUIDELINES

On each Monday during the season, ACC schools will announce any players who are out for the season or scheduled to have surgery.

No other announcements regarding player injuries will be made until the end of practice on Thursday or two days prior to the next football game (Tuesday for Thursday game, Thursday for Saturday). On that day, within 90 minutes of the end of practice, injured players' playing status for the next game will be announced in one of five categories:

- Definitely will play
- Probable
- Questionable
- Doubtful
- Out

OREGON CONNECTIONS

- Oregon passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach Matt Lubick is the son of former Colorado State head football coach Sonny Lubick. Sonny hired UVa offensive coordinator Steve Fairchild in 1993 when he was hired as the head coach at Colorado State. Fairchild was the quarterbacks coach under Lubick from 1993-96 and then was named the offensive coordinator in 1997.
- Fairchild and Matt Lubick worked on the same Colorado State staff in 1995 when the younger Lubick was a graduate assistant. When Sonny Lubick retired in 2007, Fairchild was hired as his replacement.
- Matt Lubick is familiar with UVa after working with the wide receivers at Duke from 2010-12.
- UVa special teams coordinator and running backs coach Larry Lewis faced Oregon nine times during his tenure at Washington State. Lewis and the Cougars were 4-5 from 1989-98.

SHARED HISTORY - LEWIS & CLARK EXPEDITION FROM CHARLOTTESVILLE TO OREGON

- Meriwether Lewis was born locally in Albemarle County, Virginia, in the present-day community of nearby Ivy, also the hometown of former UVa All-American Chris Long.
- After the Louisiana Purchase in 1803, President Thomas Jefferson wanted to get an accurate sense of the new land and its resources. Jefferson chose Lewis to lead the expedition. Lewis recruited another Virginian, William Clark, then age 33 to share command of the expedition.
- Clark was born in Caroline County, Va., but his family for years also lived in Albemarle County.
- The expedition commenced the beginning of what became the Oregon Trail. President Jefferson had hoped to find an "easy" route through the Rocky Mountains to discover a water route to the Pacific, via the Missouri, Columbia, Oregon or Colorado rivers as a direct and practicable water communication across the continent.
- The expedition made it all the way to Portland, Oregon and current day Astoria. Portland is roughly 110 miles north of Oregon's campus in Eugene.
- On Main Street, in downtown Charlottesville, there is a statue to pay homage to the Lewis & Clark expedition.
- This impressive and historic statue is located at the intersection of Ridge and Main Streets and commemorates the 1803-1806 journey of the Lewis and Clark Expedition. The statue has a brick walk and shrubs surrounding it, and visitors can view it anytime, though most clearly during the day.
- The statue of Meriwether Lewis, William Clark and Sacagawea was sculpted by Charles Keck, who was a prominent sculptor of his day. The statue was commissioned by Paul Goodloe McIntire and given to the citizens of Charlottesville in 1919. The statue is located in a prominent historic and geographic position in Charlottesville that predates the settlement of the town. The present day Main Street was once called Three Notch'd Road, and was constructed in the 1730's by improving an old Monacan Indian trail to allow travel between Richmond and the Shenandoah Valley.
- Artifacts that Lewis & Clark brought back from the expedition as gifts to Thomas Jefferson currently hang in the former President and UVa founder's home at Monticello.
- The Lewis & Clark Exploratory Center is located in Charlottesville, adjacent to land that William Clark's family owned for years. The Lewis & Clark Exploratory Center is a hands-on center focusing on the historic expedition as a gateway for learning about exploration, transportation, the arts, science, the natural environment, and native cultures.

THE LONG FAMILY AND BRAGGING RIGHTS

- Saturday's game will have sibling bragging rights for two sons of NFL Hall of Famer and Ivy resident Howie Long.
- The eldest son, Chris, was a UVa All-American (2007) and a current member of the St. Louis Rams. He played at UVa from 2004-07. The middle son, Kyle, spent the 2012 season as an offensive guard with the Oregon Ducks and was the Chicago Bears first round draft pick in April.
- Chris Long has a sandwich named after him at littlejohns on UVa's historic Corner.

UVa HAS YOUNGEST DEPTH CHART IN THE NATION

- Virginia has 34 underclassmen on its Week 2 depth chart, that is the most in the nation.
- Colorado State, LSU, Maryland, South Carolina and Temple are tied for No. 2 with 32.
- West Virginia and Western Michigan are No. 7 with 31.

SCHOOLS BOUND FOR THE EAST: UVA HOSTS BYU AND OREGON

• BYU and Oregon visit Scott Stadium in consecutive weeks to open the 2013 season for the Virginia Cavaliers.
 • It is the first time in UVA program history that two different schools west of the Mississippi River have come to Charlottesville to face Virginia in the same season.
 • In fact, BYU and Oregon's trips to Scott Stadium only mark the 11th and 12th time in UVA program history that the Cavaliers have hosted a team from west of the Mississippi River.
 • Teams that have visited Charlottesville from the West are: BYU (2000, 2013), Colorado State (2002), Idaho (2011), Kansas (1991), Louisiana Tech (2012), Oregon (2013), San Jose State (1998), Texas (1996), TCU (2009) USC (2008) and Wyoming (2006).
 • UVA is 6-5 against teams from west of the Mississippi River when the game is played in Charlottesville.
 • Including 2013, UVA has hosted a team from west of the Mississippi River in six of the past eight seasons after hosting only five in the first 116 years of the program.
 • The combined round trip miles for BYU and Oregon to travel to Charlottesville and back is 9,148 miles.
 • More teams from west of the Mississippi River are scheduled to come to Charlottesville in the future: UCLA (2014), Boise State (2015), Stanford (2017) and BYU (2019). UVA will return each trip the subsequent season.

SEASON CAPTAINS FOR 2013

• Seniors Luke Bowanko, Jake Snyder and Rijo Walker have been selected by their peers as captains of the 2013 football season.

FIVE STUDENT ASSISTANTS HELP STAFF, INCLUDING JACOB RAINEY

• Virginia has five student assistants currently on staff.
 • Pablo Alvarez, Adam Caplinger and Tim Cwlna will not play due to medical reasons in 2013.
 • Due to offseason surgery, Sean Cascarano is currently not participating and also helping out as a student assistant.
 • Also on that list of student assistants is Jacob Rainey, a freshman who will assist offensive coordinator Steve Fairchild with the quarterbacks.
 • Jacob Rainey, a quarterback from Woodberry Forest in Virginia, had his right leg amputated after a freak injury in a scrimmage in 2011.
 • Rainey suffered a dislocated right knee, but while he was hospitalized the news got far worse. An artery in his lower right leg had been severed, cutting off circulation. Over the next week, Rainey underwent four surgeries as doctors tried to save his leg. They were unsuccessful.
 • A week after Rainey was tackled on a routine play, doctors amputated his right leg above the knee.
 • As word of Rainey's ordeal spread, he was inundated with letters and gifts from well-wishers, including Alabama football coach Nick Saban, Green Bay Packers linebacker Clay Matthews and current New England Patriot Tim Tebow, who was quarterback for the Denver Broncos at the time.
 • Tebow reached out to Rainey and wanted to meet in person. On Dec. 24, Rainey, along with his father and older brother, attended the Broncos' game in Buffalo as Tebow's guests.
 • Rainey's experience and inspiring story was documented an episode of ESPN's series E:60.
 • The Woodberry Forest quarterback returned to the field in 2012 and played with a prosthetic leg, throwing two touchdowns on nine passes.

MORGAN MOSES WITH OVER 30 CAREER STARTS

- UVa senior offensive tackle Morgan Moses is one of 70 FBS players with at least 30 career starts entering 2013.
- Moses leads the team with 32 career starts having started the last seven games of his true freshman season in 2010, all 13 in 2011 and 11 of 12 in 2012, missing one start due to injury.
- Moses made his first career start at left tackle against BYU in the season opener.

"SMOKE SIGNALS" - UVA'S FIRST FIVE-STAR RECRUIT SINCE 2005

- Virginia freshman running back Taquan Mizzell is UVa's first five-star recruit since 2005 when offensive guard and current Jacksonville Jaguar Eugene Monroe came to Virginia.
- Mizzell elusiveness at Virginia Beach's Bayside High School earned him the nickname "Smoke" en route to being named a *Parade* All-American.
- Smoke played in the U.S. Army All-American Bowl in 2013, returning a kickoff 72 yards to set up the game-winning score as the East beat the West, 15-8.
- Smoke made his debut against BYU and received the game's opening kickoff and returned it 25 yards for his first collegiate stats.

PARKS REGISTERS ONE OF THE BEST FROSH. & SOPH. COMBINED RUSHING SEASONS IN PROGRAM HISTORY

- Junior Kevin Parks is in his first season as the starting running back for UVa, entering 2013 with two career starts to his credit.
- Parks rushed for 1,443 yards during his first two seasons at UVa.
- Of all the stellar running backs to walk the Grounds at UVa, only Wali Lundy (1,755) rushed for more combined yards than Kevin Parks through their freshman and sophomore seasons at Virginia.
- Parks also is No. 4 among UVa running backs with 35 career receptions through their first two seasons in the program.
- With 1,508 career rushing yards, Parks is No. 15 among active FBS players who are not seniors.

REMEMBER THE TITANS

- UVa's Jay Whitmire is slated to start at right tackle for the Cavaliers in 2013.
- Whitmire owns one career start entering 2013, which came in the 2012 Wake Forest game at right tackle when Morgan Moses missed the start with an injury.
- Whitmire graduated from T.C. Williams High School in Alexandria, Va., the same school made famous in Disney film, "Remember the Titans."
- There is a tragic connection between UVa and Charlottesville with one of the real life individuals from the famous Titans story.
- Gerry Bertier, the defensive lineman who was paralyzed from the waist down in an automobile accident, passed away at the University of Virginia hospital due to injuries suffered from a second accident, when his car was struck by a drunk driver on March 20, 1981 on Route 20 in Charlottesville. Bertier was 27.

TIGHT ENDS CONTINUE TO PRODUCE

- Virginia has been strong at tight end over the last decade, and that continues with Jake McGee and Zachary Swanson.
- McGee had one of the more successful offensive seasons for a tight end in recent memory, hauling in 28 receptions for 374 yards and five touchdowns in 2012.
- McGee's five touchdowns in 2012 tied for the fifth-most all-time by a UVa tight end in a season.
- Only Heath Miller (2002 & 2003), Bruce McGonnigal (1989) and Ed Carrington (1965) own more touchdowns in a season by a tight end than McGee's 2012 total.
- Swanson moves back to tight end after being the nation's tallest fullback in 2012.
- Rob Burns moved in 2012 from defensive end to tight end and should see time in 2013.
- UVa TEs have caught 583 passes for 6,252 yards and 52 TDs since 2001, by far the best figures in the ACC in that span.

- When Wilson graduated and left to play for current UVa associate head coach of offensive and tight ends coach Tom O'Brien at NC State, McGee was the quarterback that replaced Wilson at Collegiate for the 2007 season.
- McGee came to Virginia in 2010 as a quarterback and was issued No. 14. He switched to tight end the first week of preseason camp.

HARRIS HAS CAREER DAY VERSUS BYU

• Junior FS Anthony Harris had a career day against the BYU Cougars. He blocked a punt, registered a sack and his interception and subsequent lateral to ILB Henry Coley set up UVa's game-winning touchdown. He also added 11 tackles.

• For his efforts, Harris was named the Walter Camp National Defensive Player of the Week.
• Harris also was awarded a "Helmet Sticker" by ESPN's Lou Holtz.

UVA DEFENSE SLOWS DOWN BYU OFFENSE

• Despite running 93 offensive plays, the UVA defense was able to limit BYU's up-tempo offense.

• BYU accumulated 362 yards on offense for a 3.9 yards per play average, however 52 of the those 362 yards came on the game's final play.

• The previous 92 BYU offensive plays, the UVA defense limited the Cougars to 3.4 yards per play.

• BYU sustained only one double-digit drive, an 11-play, 92-yard touchdown drive in the fourth quarter.

• Virginia forced BYU into six three-and-outs and on the game's only fourth-down attempt, UVA's defense forced BYU to turnover on downs with 1:28 left in the game.

UVA GETS 3 SACKS AND INT IN OPENER

• UVA's defense collected three sacks and one INT in the opener against BYU.

• In 2012 UVA didn't register a sack until the second game of the season and didn't get its third sack until the third quarter of the third game.

• UVA didn't force any turnover, let alone an INT until the fourth game of the 2012 season at TCU where they got an INT and recovered a fumble.

NICHOLSON ANCHORS DEFENSIVE SECONDARY

• Junior CB Demetrius Nicholson is now the veteran of the Virginia defense, starting all 26 of Virginia's games since he stepped foot on Grounds prior to the 2011 season.

• Of the 1,792 defensive plays Virginia has lined up for since the opening game of the 2011 season, Nicholson has played 1,747 of those plays, meaning since Sept. 3, 2011 he has played 97.49 percent of UVa's defensive plays.

• In 2011 Demetrius Nicholson became the first freshman to start the season-opener at the corner-back position since Kevin Cook in 1986, when the Cavaliers faced South Carolina in Scott Stadium.

REPLACING GREER AND REYNOLDS

• Virginia must replace linebackers Steve Greer and La'Roy Reynolds who amassed 626 career tackles between them from 2009-12. Greer concluded his career No. 6 all-time at UVA with 376 career tackles.

• Greer's 376 career tackles are 237 more than the combined career numbers of all linebackers still in the UVA program. Daquan Romero (57), Henry Coley (44), D.J. Hill (15), Demeitre Brim (8) and Kwontie Moore (4) combined have only 139 career tackles entering 2013.

• Greer and Reynolds' 626 career tackles is almost equal to the 629 combined career tackles of every other returning Cavalier that started a game on defense in 2012.

• Greer's 376 tackles led all ACC active players at the conclusion of the 2012 season and was No. 7 among all active FBS players. Only Notre Dame's Manti Te'o had more career tackles among active BCS conference players at the time.

• Reynolds missed 2.5 games with a hand injury and still amassed 90 tackles in 10 games. Reynolds now a rookie with the Jacksonville Jaguars and was signed as a free agent.

COLEY AND MOORE SPEND SUMMER IN AFRICA

- Linebackers Henry Coley and Kwontie Moore took a summer class at Virginia that took them to South Africa in July.
- Coley and Moore paid attention to the social, economic and environmental aspects in and throughout different regions of South Africa.
- From rural regions to industrial ones, the class conversed, ate, slept and fellowshiped with locals all over the region in order to fully immerse themselves in the culture.
- The trip included two students from South Africa, 11 UVa students and one Ohio State student.
- The group visited schools, villages and took part in intellectual sharing between the groups.
- Coley and Moore were able to do some sightseeing and visit some historical landmarks, museums and Kruger National Park.

UVA HAS NO SENIORS STARTERS IN SECONDARY

- UVa has zero seniors in its starting secondary for the second year in a row after having three senior starters in 2011.
- UVa in 2012 was one of three other schools (Florida State, LSU and North Texas) in the nation that also lacked a senior in their secondary.
- UVa in 2013 has one senior on its roster that plays in the secondary - captain and free safety Rijo Walker is the backup to junior Brandon Phelps.

UVA CLOSED 2012 RANKED IN THREE & OUTS

- UVa closed out 2012 No. 15 in the nation as a defense forcing three and outs, posting a 4.58 three and out average per game.
- UVa's opponents went three and out 55 times over 12 games; 33.5 percent of UVa's opponents drives ended in a three and out.
- UVa was No. 3 in the ACC as Florida State led the nation at 47.3 percent of drives ending in a three and out.
- Former NC State assistant head coach for defense and current UVa defensive coordinator Jon Tenuta helped the Wolfpack (5.08 per game) tie for No. 8 and Clemson (4.00 per game) was No. 20, rounding out the ACC in the top 20.
- UVa opens 2013 with BYU, who finished 2012 ranked No. 3 in the nation with 5.31 three and outs per game.

TENUTA GIVING UVA'S DEFENSE AN AGGRESSIVE MAKEOVER IN 2013

- Virginia's new associate head coach for defense and defensive coordinator Jon Tenuta is a UVa alum and looking to bring an aggressive makeover to the Cavaliers.
- UVa over the past five seasons has the sixth-worst turnover margin in the nation. In 2012 UVa recorded only four interceptions, the fewest by a Virginia Cavalier team since the birth of the forward pass.
- Tenuta said prior to the season that "we want to create problems for the front five and never let the quarterback set his feet in the passing game."
- UVa over the past few seasons have been near the bottom nationally in turnover margin and sacks per game - Tenuta wants to change that.
- Tenuta enters his 33rd season of collegiate coaching and his 17th as a defensive coordinator. He has had stops in the ACC, Big Ten, Big 12 and at Notre Dame and looks to create turnovers and sack numbers that have declined in recent years at UVa.

UVA PUNTS 13 TIMES VS. BYU AND WINS

- UVa punted 13 times against BYU and won, which is the first time this century that an FBS team has punted 13 times and still won the football game.
- UVa's 13 punts by Alec Vozenilek are tied for the eighth-most punts in a game by UVa. It also happened in 1937 against Maryland, 1940 against North Carolina and 1931 against Virginia Tech.
- The 13 punts are the most by a UVa team since they punted 15 times against South Carolina in 1972.

NEW PRIMARY PLACEKICKER FOR UVA

- For the third season in a row, UVa entered the year with a different placekicker atop of the depth chart.
- Robert Randolph concluded his four-year career in 2011 and he was followed by Drew Jarrett in 2012.
- Heading into the 2013 camp, Ian Frye was slated to take the primary placekicking duties for the Cavaliers.
- Also in the mix to replace Jarrett is redshirt freshman Dylan Sims and fifth-year transfer R.C. Willenbrock, who graduated from Dartmouth in May. Willenbrock played in one game for the Big Green in 2009 and missed the 2010 and 2011 seasons with an injury. Willenbrock also played in nine games for the Dartmouth men's lacrosse team from 2010-12.
- Willenbrock built his own computer at the age of 13.
- Frye has the most experience as the primary kickoff specialist for UVa in 2012. He was 3-of-5 on field goals with a long of 30 yards in 2012. Frye kicked off 48 times with 22 touchbacks. He averaged 62.0 yards per kickoff.

DID YOU KNOW?

- UVa WR Tim Smith is cousins with MLB stars B.J. and Justin Upton of the Atlanta Braves. Smith's father, Timothy Smith, Sr., is first cousins with B.J. and Justin's father, Manny Upton.
- UVa quarterback David Watford and current wide receivers coach Marques Hagans are first cousins and both were quarterbacks at Hampton High before enrolling at UVa.
- UVa's oldest living football alum, Dr. John Risher, turned 103 years old this year; he also works in the press box on the UVa stats crew on game day. (More on page 13).
- Paul Wisman also works in the press box on the UVa stats crew staff and has done so since 1956. His 58 straight years of work in the press box is the longest current streak in the nation (More on page 11).
- Current UVa offensive line coach Scott Wachenheim was the offensive coordinator at Liberty (2006-08) when UVa WR Dominique Terrell's older brother, Zach, was a standout All-Big South running back and slot receiver for the Flames.
- 2013 marks the first time in program history UVa has had eight home games on the schedule and is the sixth season in a row that UVa has had at least seven home games on the schedule.
- CB Demetrious Nicholson has been growing his signature dread locks since the summer of 2005, just before he entered the sixth grade.
- Redshirt freshman Kyle Dockins also has been growing his dread locks since the sixth grade, dating back to 2006.
- Redshirt freshman CB Kelvin Rainey has two brothers who have played FBS football. His older brother Johnathan played at New Mexico (2008-11), while his other older brother Derrick is a senior this year at Arizona.
- Redshirt freshman Israel Vaughan's older brother, Joshua, is a member of the Atlanta Falcons, played for Mike London at Richmond and was a member of its 2008 FCS National Championship team.
- Air Force Academy graduate and UVa assistant coach Scott Wachenheim was awarded his bachelor's degree by then-President Ronald Reagan.
- Graduate assistant Jacob Hodges served as a team manager for two years (2008, 2009) and then was a three-year letterwinner as UVa's holder (2010-12).
- CB DreQuan Hoskey, DE Trent Corney and RB Khalek Shepherd all were members of the UVa track & field team in 2013.
- Hoskey also ran track at Virginia in 2010 and competed at the ACC and NCAA Championships.
- Freshman Daniel Hamm came to UVa to run track. He also walked on to the football team as a tailback.
- Redshirt freshman CB C.J. Moore is the nephew of Gail Devers, three-time Olympic champion in track & field.
- Sophomore Trent Corney's older brother, Taylor, won the Bronze at the 2009 Pan American Junior Championships in the Decathlon. Taylor has also been ranked in the Top 10 in the world in the Decathlon.

- Watford, who appeared in 10 games off the bench for Virginia in 2011, is a sophomore and every other quarterback at UVa are freshmen, two redshirted in 2012 with Watford. UVa also has zero upperclassmen in its quarterback corps.

WATFORD OWNS OVERTIME WIN FOR VIRGINIA

- David Watford led UVa to an overtime victory over Idaho in 2011.
- Coming off the bench as a true freshman, Watford completed a 27-yard pass to fellow true freshman Dominique Terrell for what ended up as the game-winning touchdown.
- The Virginia defense deflected a two-point attempt afterwards to solidify the overtime victory, 21-20.
- Watford ended the Idaho game 10-of-20 for 95 yards and the touchdown.

DAVID WATFORD MAKES FIRST CAREER START AGAINST BYU

- UVa head coach Mike London announced during a teleconference on Aug. 12 that David Watford would be the starting quarterback.
- Against BYU Watford became the fourth different QB to start a game during the Mike London era at Virginia.
- Of London's 38 games at UVa, 12 have been started by Marc Verica, 21 by Michael Rocco, four by Phillip Sims and one by David Watford.
- Watford is the seventh different UVa QB to start a game since the start of the 2007 season. Included in that group was two games started by Vic Hall and two by Peter Lalich. The other 71 games over the span of six seasons have been started by Jameel Sewell (23), Marc Verica (22), Michael Rocco (21), Phillip Sims (4) and David Watford (1).

A LOOK BACK AT COLLEGE FOOTBALL HISTORY ON THE GROUNDS OF UVA AS THE COLONNADES AT LAMBETH FIELD CELEBRATE 100 YEARS

- The colonnades at Lambeth Field turn 100 in 2013. The playing surface at Lambeth Field hosted Virginia football from 1902 until Scott Stadium opened up in the midst of the 1931 season on Oct. 15, 1931.
- Lambeth Field is the location where the American game of football that we know today, played from youth league all the way up to the NFL, was first played.
- It all started in 1909 with the death of UVA's Archer Christian.
- Christian died in 1909 as a result of injuries sustained in a football game at Georgetown on Nov. 13, 1909. Christian's death highlighted 29 football related deaths during the 1909 season. Papers from all over the country carried the front-page headline of Christian's death.
- Former UVA President Edwin A. Alderman and the father of UV athletics, William Lambeth, went to New York City to meet with other presidents and administrators from other big time universities to discuss how they could make the game of football safer.
- At the time there was legislation happening in Washington to make it illegal to play the game of football in America.
- A new rules committee that was appointed from that meeting in New York City included Lambeth and the father of American football, Walter Camp.
- Lambeth noted to the committee, which met almost on a monthly basis, that the two deaths he had seen personally were due to exhaustion. At the time there were no substitutions, if you came out you could no longer return. The original game had a lot of pulling and pushing. Players were not considered down until they really couldn't move under the pile. Lambeth suggested that the game be split into four quarters, totaling 15 minutes a piece and that players could substitute back in. Walter Camp's notes from the committee meetings credit Lambeth, in the margins, with these changes.
- The committee asked Lambeth to take the new rules back to the University of Virginia and experiment with them during the spring of 1910.
- On the Grounds of the University of Virginia, under the watchful eye of William Lambeth, a new version of American football, divided into four quarters was played for the first time in history.
- Other notable rules that were played for the first time that spring at Lambeth Field were: seven men required on the line at the time of the snap, players could no longer push or pull the ball carrier and the forward pass could now be made across the line of scrimmage.
- Virginia football returned to its roots at Lambeth Field in 2013 camp, taking part in two scrimmages on the hallowed ground.

WISEMAN AND RISHER HAVE BOTH WORKED ON UVA'S FOOTBALL STAT CREW FOR 50+ YEARS

- Paul Wiseman and Dr. John Risher have each worked on the stats crew at Scott Stadium for over 50 years.
- Wiseman enters his 58th consecutive season on the UVA stat crew, which is tied with Toledo's Chet Sullwold for the longest active streak in FBS football. Both men started in 1956.
- Risher began in 1963 and enters his 51st season in a row.
- Risher use to be Wiseman's primary care physician down in Lynchburg before retiring. When Risher found out what Wiseman did with UVA, he hounded him to plug him in with the stats crew too.
- Risher is UVA's oldest living football alum. He turned 103 on May 13 of this year. He golfed nine holes on his 100th birthday in 2010.
- Wiseman has missed only one home game at Scott Stadium since he started working on the stat crew and that was the 2011 season-opening game against William & Mary.
- The William & Mary game in 2011 is the only home game Wiseman has missed for that matter at Scott Stadium since 1946.
- In April 2013, both Risher and Wiseman were recipients of this year's "Order of the Crossed Sabre" award, which goes annually to someone who has contributed greatly to Virginia football.

SCOTT STADIUM, HOME OF THE CAVALIERS

The Carl Smith Center, home of David A. Harrison III Field at Scott Stadium, with its unique architectural design, scenic setting on the University's Grounds and exceptional sight lines, is one of the nation's finest college football settings.

Opened in 1931, Scott Stadium might be one of the oldest campus college football stadiums in the nation, but you could never tell from its appearance. Numerous upgrades and expansions make it a modern home for the Cavaliers and their fans.

Scott Stadium was the gift of Frederic William Scott and Elisabeth Strother Scott, and was dedicated to the memory of his parents, Frederic Robert Scott and Frances Branch Scott.

Virginia played its dedication game at Scott Stadium on Oct. 15, 1931 against the Virginia Military Institute before a then-capacity crowd of 22,000. Prior to that season, the Cavaliers staged their home games at the University's Lambeth Field.

Virginia has played 428 games in the historic venue. UVA's all-time record at Scott Stadium stands at 245-172-12.

As Mike London prepares for his fourth season as the head football coach at Virginia, the makeup of the Cavalier program continues to change and improve.

London will enter the 2013 season with a lot of new looks. His coaching staff underwent a major overhaul following a 4-8 finish in 2012 and now features five new faces sporting a significant amount of major college coaching experience. London's fourth edition of UVa football will feature new coordinators on offense, defense, special teams and for recruiting.

The Virginia football program took on a dramatic new look in March when the George Welsh Indoor Practice Facility opened behind the McCue Center. The facility, that features a full field and end zones, allows the Cavaliers to practice and train without disruption from inclement weather. As part of the project, the team's primary practice field received a new FieldTurf playing surface.

Topping off the off-season was another top-30 recruiting class that featured the first five-star signee in London's tenure at Virginia.

With all of those changes, there is still one constant in the Virginia program - London's desire to build a program that competes for championships. While the results from the 2012 campaign were not satisfactory for London, the team featured a number of young players who displayed the ability to turn the fortunes of the Cavaliers like they experienced in 2011.

That season the Cavaliers went 8-4 during the regular season, finished second in the ACC's Coastal Division with a 5-3 mark and played Auburn in the 2011 Chick-fil-A Bowl. The Cavaliers were one win from advancing to the ACC's Championship game.

The Virginia turnaround featured four games that the team won in the final seconds. Along the way the Cavaliers became the first college football program to ever win road games at Miami and Florida State in the same season on the way to UVa being ranked in the Associated Press Top-25 poll for the first time since the 2007 season.

For his efforts, London was recognized as the Atlantic Coast Conference's Coach of the Year. He was also selected by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes to receive its 2011 Grant Teaff Coach of the Year Award. A total of five Cavalier players earned either first or second-team All-ACC honors. The 2011 team saw two players - CB Chase Minnifield and OG Austin Pasztor - receive All-America honors and CB Demetrious Nicholson was named a Freshman All-American.

In the spring of 2013 OT Oday Aboushi was selected by the New York Jets to mark the 30th consecutive season a UVa player has been picked in the NFL Draft, the second longest streak among ACC schools.

Since taking over the Virginia program London has worked tirelessly to build relationships with the University's faculty and staff, alumni and former players, fans and supporters and the region's high school coaches. He has made dozens of appearances, spoke at clinics and been readily available to the media. He did not just wait for constituents to come to Virginia, he actively took the Cavalier program to the public.

London embraced a groundbreaking 18-episode television production entitled "The Building of a Program" that gave an all-access look at UVa football. He has had the team hold spring practices and coaches clinics across the state, including in Virginia Beach to build support and interest in one of the state's most fertile recruiting areas.

He quickly defined the culture for the football team by prescribing three basic tenets for his players:

- Go to Class
- Show Class
- Treat People with Dignity and Respect

The results of his actions were tangible. In his first spring semester at UVa the team posted its best cumulative grade point average in 10 years and student-athletes were heavily involved in community service projects and outreach programs.

While all of those things are impressive, London is the first to remind everyone his primary goal is to reverse the fortunes of the Cavalier program on the field. Success has been a big part of the Mike London story even prior to being named the 39th coach in the Virginia program's history.

In two seasons at Richmond, London led the Spiders to a 24-5 record. In his first year at the helm, his team went 13-3 and won the Football Championship Series national title. The 2009 Spider team, ranked nine consecutive weeks at No. 1 in the FCS polls, went 11-2 and reached the quarterfinals of the FCS playoffs. His teams were 13-4 in the Colonial Athletic Association during the 2008 and 2009 campaigns.

London's efforts in 2008 earned him FCS National Coach of the Year honors from both the American Football Coaches Association and Schutt Sports/ American Football Monthly magazine. London was also honored as the Black Coaches Association Male Coach of the Year in 2008, beating out Mike Tomlin of the Super Bowl Champion Pittsburgh Steelers for the award. In addition to the national honors, London was tabbed the State Coach of the Year from both VaSID and the Peninsula Sports Club.

Under London's watch, 16 Spiders were named to the All-CAA Football Team in 2009 after placing 12 in 2008. His first year at UR, nine Spiders garnered 15 All-America awards and six were recognized on the Academic All-Conference Team. DE Lawrence Sidbury was a fourth-round NFL draft pick by the Atlanta Falcons, while RB Josh Vaughan was a free-agent signee by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Before returning to coach his alma mater, London spent six of seven seasons coaching for Al Groh at Virginia. In 2001 London joined the UVa staff for the first time as the defensive line coach. He took over the responsibilities as recruiting coordinator in 2002. In 2005 London left UVa to work as the defensive line coach for the NFL's Houston Texas. He returned to Virginia in 2006 as the defensive coordinator and defensive line coach.

During his tenure with the Cavaliers, he saw five defensive players (Chris Long, Marcus Hamilton, Chris Canty, Andrew Hoffman and Monsanto Pope) drafted by NFL teams. Long was the ACC Defensive Player of the Year in 2007, earned unanimous All-America honors, was the Ted Hendricks Award winner as the nation's top defensive end and the second overall selection in the 2008 NFL Draft.

A native of Hampton, Va., London played defensive back at Richmond from 1979-82. Under head coach Dal Shealy, he led the Spiders with six interceptions as a senior captain in 1982. In addition to earning all-state honors, he was chosen the team's MVP and received the Spiders' Coaches Award. In 1982, the Virginia Peninsula Sports Club selected him as the male in-state Athlete of the Year.

London graduated from Richmond in 1983 with a bachelor's degree in sociology and a year later received a degree in law enforcement from the Richmond Police Academy, serving as a detective for the street crimes unit from November of 1984 to July of 1989. The Dallas Cowboys signed him as a free agent in 1983.

London broke into the collegiate coaching ranks in 1989, spending two seasons with Richmond as the outside linebackers coach and admissions liaison, followed by four seasons (1991-94) as the defensive line coach at William & Mary.

He returned to Richmond for two more years (1995-96) as the outside linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator, coaching All-America LB Shawn Barber, who was a fourth-round draft pick by the Washington Redskins in 1998 and

played 10 years in the NFL. London served as defensive line coach at Boston College for the 1997-2000 seasons, where he helped lead the Eagles to two bowl appearances.

London and his wife Regina, are the parents of four children - Ticynn, Korben, Jaicyn and Madicyn. He has three older children, Michael, Jr., Brandon and Kristen through a previous marriage. The 51-year-old London was born in West Point, N.Y. in 1960.

His son, Brandon, led Massachusetts in receiving in 2006 and finished his career as the school's second leading receiver. He was signed to the Miami Dolphins active roster in 2008 after spending the 2007 season on the Super Bowl Champion New York Giants practice squad. Brandon since 2010 has been with the Montreal Alouettes of the CFL. One of London's daughters, Kristen, played on the UVa women's basketball team during the 2007-08 and 2008-09 seasons. His younger brother, Paul, was a defensive back at UVa from 1991-95.

LONDON ONE OF TWO FBS COACHES WITH FCS NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP
